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Kindergarten

Wow! October is here, and the beginning of the year has flown by. The students have been working very hard and have learned a great deal. The students will continue to work on recognizing the alphabet names and sounds. They have also been working on phonics skills to strengthen their ability to decode words when they are reading. In math, the students are working on number sense of the numbers 1 to 10. In writing, they are learning to print names, numbers, sight words, and the letters of the alphabet. Sadly, October is often the beginning of cold and flu season. If your child is feeling ill, help stop the spread of illness by keeping them home when sick.

Ist & 2nd Grade

In first and second grade, students are working on skills to become strong readers. First grade students have spent much time learning and creating projects about the human body. In conjunction with our reading program, first grade students will now focus on various ancient civilizations. Don't be surprised to hear discussions about ancient Mesopotamia or the Egyptian Pyramids. Second grade students will be focusing on Early Asian and Ancient Greek civilizations. In math, first grade will focus on a variety of ways to solve addition problems, with a focus on adding doubles. Second grade will continue to work on place value. Through the Second Step program, students in first and second grade have been working on learning skills. These include listening, rules, focusing, and following directions. Please make sure your child is reading at home for 15–20 minutes every night and remember to sign their binders every day.

3rd-5th Grade

October sure is a busy month! We have Parent/Teacher conferences the week of September 30th. Third grade will be reading classic tales and will be starting patterns and multiplication. Fourth grade will be adding and subtracting whole numbers and moving into multiplication. They will also be reading about The Middle Ages. Dr. Hertzler from MCC will be talking to fourth grade on October 25th. Fifth grade has finished writing their personal narratives and are moving on to a government unit. Have a wonderful Fall Break! We look forward to seeing you at conferences!

6th - 8th grade

Our school year is well under way. Students have been busy practicing routines and learning new concepts in Math, ELA, Science, and Social Studies. Parent-teacher conferences will take place September $30^{\rm th}$ – October $4^{\rm th}$, the week before Fall Break. We look forward to meeting with you to go over your child's progress.

The much anticipated STEM Camp at Chauncey Ranch is Wednesday, November 6th, through Friday, November 8th. We hope to build a sense of community among our students as we use nature as our classroom. We leave from school on Wednesday morning, and return Friday afternoon. A three-day weekend follows due to Veteran's Day on Monday, November 11th. Please reach out if you have any questions or concerns. The \$50 payment is due to the office by October 18th.

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LIMIT THE SUN BUT NOT THE FUN! BE "SUNWISE!"



Use Sunscreen Every Day!

Even on cloudy days, the sun's rays can damage your skin. Wear sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher. Apply 15 minutes before going outside and reapply every 2 ½ hours or sooner if perspiring or engaging in water activities. Wearing sunscreen every day is as important as brushing your teeth!



Wear a Hat and Lip Balm!

A hat with a wide brim offers good protection for your scalp, ears, face and the back of your neck. The bigger the brim, the better the protection. Protect lips with SPF 15+ balm.



Wear Sunglasses!

Sunglasses reduce sun exposure that can damage your eyes and lead to cataracts. Check the label and choose sunglasses that block at least 90% of UVA and UVB rays.



Cover Up!

Wear long sleeves and pants if possible to protect your skin when playing or working outdoors. Darker colors and fabric with a tight weave provide the most protection.



Limit Time in the Midday Sun!

Limit your outdoor activities when the UV rays are the strongest and most damaging (10 a.m. to 4 p.m.). Remember: Watch Your Shadow--No Shadow, Seek Shade!



Seek Shade!

Find something fun that doesn't involve the direct sun. Look for shade under a tree, a ramada or find an indoor activity inside a gym, library or classroom during peak UV.



Check the daily UV Index!

Did you know you can check the intensity of the sun's rays every day? The ultraviolet or UV index is a way of measuring the sun's radiation level. The scale is from 1 to 10. The higher the UV, the more careful you should be. A day with a UV rating of 10 requires more protection than a day with a rating of 1.



Avoid Sun Lamps and Tanning Booths!

These artificial sources of UV light can cause as much damage as the sun's UV rays. Remember, there is no such thing as a safe tan. To get a tan, skin damage has to occur!
